SUMMER IS STILL UPON US

And still an important time to conserve!

The Cape used 447,470 gallons of water in July, and we only had .64" of rain in June and July. YTD rain is 30% below normal rainfall.

Last July we all used 399,470. That's 48,035 less gallons of water.

This year we have 110 users who used less than 5,000 gallons this July. Yea Team!

Give yourselves a well-deserved pat on the back!

19 users used more than 5,000 gallons. Your challenge is to monitor your meter and inform guests and landscapers/gardeners of their need to conserve. Many thanks!

How Much Water Does a "Drip" Waste?

A slow dripping faucet – a drip every 4 seconds, would amount to over 40 gallons a month: enough to completely fill your hot water tank or a bath tub. Just think: if everyone had a leak like that we would be wasting a lot of water. Do your part. Fix it.

DROUGHT TOLERANT PLANTS

These are plants that require very little water beyond normal rainfall after they are established. To "establish" them requires hand-watering during the dry season for the first two or three years every two to three days, then they will survive with only drip irrigation, or in <u>some</u> years on the island, with normal rainfall.

. Choose the pdf file and find a great list of Drought Tolerant Plants at the bottom of the document. Further up the document is another list called Wet Winter/Dry Summer, which contains other drought tolerant plants.



DRIP IRRIGATION

What is Drip Irrigation? This is the least wasteful way to water plants. It basically requires a timer, ½" central lines to/through your bed(s), with ¼ inch tubing to each individual plant, with an emitter at the end. For row-crops, trees, large deck planters, or raised vegetable gardens there is another delivery option. Rather than individual emitters for each plant, you can connect either ¼" or ½" emitter tubing, which has an emitter every six inches. In the vegetable garden, you simply place a plant near each emitter, for a large pot or a tree, you encircle the pot or tree. You want to avoid watering the whole garden – that wastes water, and promotes weed growth. Just water the plants you want!
